<u>From the Rabbí</u> Rabbi Jonathan Kupetz



Shabbat has always excited the Jewish imagination. It was Ahad HaAm, the 19th century Zionist thinker, who discovered in Shabbat the source of the unity of our people. He said, "More than the People of Israel has kept the Shabbat, the Shabbat has kept the People of Israel." Abraham Joshua Heschel called Shabbat a "sanctuary in time."

Shabbat is a day of possibilities, opportunities to create *z'man kodesh*—sacred time. Shabbat can be a walk with your spouse, a visit with a friend, giving yourself the luxury of reading a book or listening to music just for pleasure. It can be playing a board game with your kids. It can be one day of the week that you don't go near the computer, a day to unplug from the world and plug into your soul. Celebrating Shabbat can re-connect you with your spiritual center, and with the people you love and cherish in your life.

Shabbat is also an opportunity to connect with Jewish teachings, Jewish melodies, and with our Jewish community. We have many opportunities to study, worship, and celebrate together on Shabbat.

Each Friday night at 7:30 pm we have our Shabbat T'filah (Service), and on the first Friday of each month, TBI's Shul Band adds a different musical dimension to our service. Also, once a month we read Torah on Friday evening (see *Kehillah* for dates).

In addition to our regular 7:30 pm services, we offer our Family Erev Shabbat T'filah (service for preschool and young elementary children and their families) at 6:30 pm on the second Friday of each month. TYBI (Temple Youth of Beth Israel), our teen youth group, also hosts occasional teens services on Friday evenings.

On Shabbat mornings, we offer Torah study each week in the Library at 9:30 am, Shabbat t'filah in the sanctuary when we celebrate bar/bat mitzvah, and our lay-led Beit Midrash Minyan the third Shabbat of each month at 10:30 am.

Be on the lookout for special Shabbat programs in the coming months—opportunities to gather for *Havdalah* (ceremony marking end of Shabbat), Shabbat hikes, and other programs.

In this season of giving thanks, we sometimes wonder, "For what is there is to give thanks? Steven is gone...always and forever." Then, of course, our minds turn to our son, Eli, who is thriving at Monmouth College in Illinois, and for that we are most thankful. We are thankful that we have each other to lean on and the support of a close-knit *framily*. friends + family = *framily*.

We are also thankful beyond words for the spiritual guidance and love that both Rabbi and Cantor provided to us during those initial, heart-wrenching days and weeks. Their outreached arms embraced us, even when we didn't feel much like being embraced.

Finally, we are so grateful for the amazing community that is TBI! Our congregation is filled with people who genuinely care: some who have generously (and anonymously) helped us afford the unexpected financial burdens; some who cooked and prepared food for tons of guests, and then packed up the leftovers for our visiting family before doing all the cleaning; some who have offered prayers and made contributions in Steven's memory; some who have simply held our hands or allowed us to cry on their shoulders. And still others, who when we walk through the temple doors, smile and with their eyes tell us, "You are loved here" or "We are here for you"!

To each and every one of you – "Thank you from the bottom of our hearts."

Remembering Prior Religious School Committees From TBI Minutes By Margie Kerstine, Archivist

June 10, 1968

Religious School Chairman is Harry Schonfeld. He reported that seven children scheduled for Bar Mitzvah in the next few months are inadequately prepared. H. Schonfeld moved and H. Goodman seconded that we arrange for summer tutorial services, not to exceed \$200, with Mr. Peles for these students.

July 14, 1969

B. Simon moved that we raise Religious School registration fee to \$15 per child regardless of age. Marv Abrams referred this motion to the Executive Committee.

October 12, 1970

Religious Education Committee Report by Dr. M. Abrams: As of September 14, there were 199 students in the Religious School from 103 families. Last year there were 275 students. The Hebrew Department also showed a drop in enrollment. A more detailed report will be made next month. The teachers are now being paid on an hourly basis ranging from \$5 to \$6.50 per hour. The present salary commitments are \$6,802.50 with a budget of \$8,000. Plans to reduce the cost of Hebrew teachers' salaries are also being discussed.

Temple Beth Israel's **Mitzvah Network** is an opportunity for our congregants to learn about community service projects locally and tikkun olam in general. This month we are pleased to spotlight the service activities of temple member **Shelby McNamara**.

Shelby is involved, on behalf of Mijac Alarm, with the Upland Foothill Kiwanis Club. "Upland-Foothill Kiwanis is a hands-on, non-profit volunteer organization that serves children, families, and seniors in Upland and beyond." The Club meets every Wednesday morning at 7:00 am at the Landecena Center on San Bernardino Road in Upland. Kiwanis is involved in about 60 projects throughout the year and raises all the funds for those projects at their annual golf tournament in September. As one of the projects, Shelby was recently involved in helping cook Thanksgiving lunch for 150 seniors at the Gibson Senior Center, as well as helping with Christmas dinner in December.

Shelby is the Kiwanis advisor for the Builders Club at Upland Jr. High School. The Builders Club helps "to develop competent, capable, caring leaders through the vehicle of service." They meet every other week and the students decide what community service projects they want to work on throughout the year. Shelby loves seeing the students get excited about helping others and learning to think about improving their city. Last year, the students created a book with pictures and words of encouragement as a gift to foster children for comfort in tough times. Shelby also helps out with brochures, social media, website, and flyers for Kiwanis events.

For the last seven years, INSAN has been assisting in a collaborative effort to provide thousands of freshly cooked Thanksgiving meals to homeless, seniors, and families in need. This past November, volunteers helped cook about 60–80 turkeys, packed about 800 Thanksgiving hot meals, and delivered them to the needy and poor in the Pomona area, in addition to feeding about 150–300 guests at the site. Thank you to all of our TBI congregants who participated in INSAN's Thanksgiving meals program, especially in light of St Ambrose's program being discontinued. January 5, 2019 / 28 Tevet 5779 Va-eira Exodus 6:2-9:35

Parashah Va-eira begins with God saying to Moses: "Va-eira... And I appeared to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob." We are told of the relationship between God and the Jewish people and of the promise to give the Land of Israel to the people. God tells Moses that the time has come to free the Israelites from Egyptian bondage. Moses is told that he should go before Pharaoh to ask that the Egyptian ruler allow the Israelites to depart. Twice Moses responds by saying that Pharaoh will not listen and apologetically explains that, because of a speech impediment, he is not the right person to represent the Jewish people. God answers by declaring that Moses' brother, Aaron, will accompany him as the spokesman.

The two brothers appear before Pharaoh to request the freedom of their people, but Pharaoh refuses to liberate them. As a consequence, terrible plagues are set upon Egypt. The waters of the Nile are bloodied; then the land is filled with frogs and swarms of insects; then there is the death of Egyptian livestock, and later there is destructive hail. These plagues are sent to punish Pharaoh and to force him to free the Israelites.

January 12, 2019 / 6 Sh'vat 5779 Bo

Exodus 10:1-13:16

Parashah Bo takes its name from the first word of God's command to Moses, "Go (*Bo*) to Pharaoh." Moses and Aaron continue to plead with Pharaoh to let the Israelites go free. Because he refuses, the Egyptians are punished with plagues of locusts, darkness, and, finally, the death of their firstborn. Pharaoh tells Moses, "Be gone from me!" God then tells Moses that, after the last plague, Pharaoh will let the Israelites leave. That midnight, Moses leads the Israelites out of Egypt and proclaims that each year on the evening of the fourteenth day of the first month, a festival lasting seven days will be celebrated in order to recall their liberation from Egypt. Matzah, or "unleavened bread," shall be eaten during the seven days, and on the first night of the festival, the children will be told how God freed their people from the house of bondage.

January 19, 2019 / 13 Sh'vat 5779 B'shalach Exodus 13:17-17:16

Parashah B'shalach takes its name from the second word of the Torah portion. *B'shalac*h means "when he sent forth" and refers to Pharaoh's decision to free the Israelites. Led by Moses, they depart from Egypt; but Pharaoh changes his mind and decides to pursue them. When the Israelites see Pharaoh and his army approaching, they complain to Moses that he has brought them into the wilderness to die. He assures them that God will save them and leads them through the Sea of Reeds. From the other side, they watch as the pursuing Egyptians are drowned. In celebration, Moses and the Israelites sing a song of praise to God. Afterwards, they begin their journey through the Sinai desert. Despite their victory over the Egyptians and their liberation, however, the Israelites continue to complain to Moses. They cry out that they have no water to drink, no bread to eat. God grants them water and provides them with "manna," a food substance resembling flour. While the Israelites are camped at Rephidim, they are attacked by the Amalekites. Joshua, who has been appointed by Moses, successfully destroys the Amalekite forces.

January 26, 2019 / 20 Sh'vat 5779 Yitro Evodus 18:1 20:22

Exodus 18:1-20:23

Parashah Yitro continues the journey of the Israelites across the Sinai desert. Before returning to Egypt, Moses had left his wife, Zipporah and his two sons, Gershom and Eliezer, with his father-in-law, Jethro. Hearing that Moses has freed the Israelites from Egypt, Jethro brings Zipporah and her children to the Israelite camp. Moses tells his father-in-law about the Israelite liberation and they offer sacrifices of thanksgiving to God. The next day, Jethro observes that the people are bringing all their problems to Moses. He suggests that the burden is too great for one person to bear and advises Moses to choose trustworthy people to share leadership with him. Moses takes his advice. Three months after entering the Sinai desert, Moses and the Israelites camp at Mount Sinai. Moses goes up to the top of the mountain and God speaks to him, giving him the Ten Commandments. Below, the people hear thunder and see lightning. They remain at a distance while Moses communes with God.

A Dessert for Tu BiSh'vat Date and Walnut PieFrom Saveur

The top of this pie browns quite quickly, so I would advise covering the surface with a piece of aluminum foil once it becomes a dark golden brown. Just make sure to tent your piece of aluminum foil so it doesn't touch the surface of the pie, which is delicate while baking.

- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup pitted chopped dates
- 1 cup walnuts, chopped
- 2 eggs

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour a 9-inch glass or metal pie dish. Combine sugar, baking powder, and 3 tablespoons of the flour in a medium bowl and set aside. Put the dates and 1 tablespoon flour into another medium bowl and stir with a fork until dates are evenly coated with flour. Add walnuts, mix well and set aside.

2. Put eggs into a medium mixing bowl and beat well. Stir in date and walnut mixture. Add flour and sugar mixture, and stir until well combined. Pour batter into prepared dish and bake until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, about 30-35 minutes. Serve warm or at room temperature.
