IT HAPPENED IN POMONA

Many and varied have been the reasons advanced by civic-minded Pomona boosters for our far city's growth in population. Down through the years their resounding praise of Pomona has filled the columns of Pomona newspapers...

It is not our intention to repeat those time-worn platitudes here. But there is one interesting reason for Pomona's amazing growth that possibly was not mentioned as somewhat of a shock to those of you who hold to the salubrious climate, fertile soil, and boundless natural resources theories. The story can be found in a yellowed and dust covered newspaper file for the year 1915.

It was told by a factual minded editor who perhaps at the time did not realize the full significance of the words he wrote. That editor's story, like the famous Rosetta Stone of antiquity, gives us the key which unlocks at least one long hidden factor in Pomona's remarkable early day population increase. This is what he wrote:

"Scarcely a day passes that some East bound overland passenger is not put off the train at Pomona. For Pomona is the kick-off spot, the nod of the ticket inspector's route, on trains leaving Los Angeles for the East. It is his job to carefully scrutinize overland tickets for marks of fraud or forgery, and when he finds evidence of fraudulent use of tickets, the holders, despite loud protestations and excuses, get put off the train at Pomona."

Well, there you have the story... but one mystery still remains. How in the world did that editor ever square himself with the chamber of commerce folks for having intimated that anyone would engage in "loud protestations and excuses" to stop off in Pomona?

Group To Use Opera Proceeds For Casa Colina

The "Opera for Pomona" committee in charge of arrangements for the performance of "The Golden West" opera company in Pomona high school auditorium on Saturday evening, January 24, announced today that all proceeds above expenses for the event will be donated to the Casa Colina convalescent home in China for crippled children.

The advance reservation sale for the presentation has met with a gratifying response and the indications are that a full house will greet the opera company comprising principal singers, chorus and orchestra.

The opera troupe has agreed to donate to Casa Colina a modest guarantee and the local expenses for the production are being held to a minimum to aid in the benefit event, said Burton P. Arant, who heads the "Opera for Pomona" committee.

Members of the opera company have expressed themselves in favor of the proposal to aid the crippled children's home and for that purpose contracted the Pomona engagement for a minimum amount, said Arant.

Advance reservations will soon close to be taken by mail or telephone at 346 E. 2nd street where tickets will go on sale Saturday, January 15. Tickets will also be mailed Saturday to those who have made advance reservations.

The Golden West Opera company performs the same opera in Pasadena civic auditorium the following week. Harold Hood, best known former resident of the Pomona, will sing the title role.

In February the opera company will travel to Mexico for a three weeks engagement during which they will present eight different operas.

Cloudy Skies But No Rain Expected

Center Building Ceremonies Held At Local Site

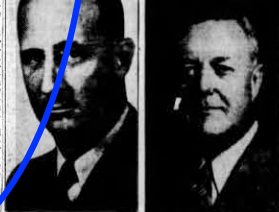

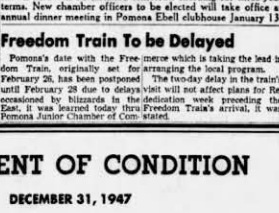

AUTO THEFT PREVENTION SOUGHT

Pomona 20-30 club launched a program today aimed at reducing the number of stolen automobiles in Pomona in 1948.

The campaign consists of pasting gunned labels on all of the some 800 parking meters throughout the downtown business district, requesting motorists not to leave their keys in the cars. The "keys in the car" message was to be affixed on each parking meter where the motorist could not fail to read it while inserting coins for parking time.

The practice of leaving keys in automobiles was responsible for nearly half of the automobile thefts in Pomona during 1947, according to Police Chief J. B. Adams, who said that the club is promoting the campaign. Six pumps from the state San Dimas sheriff's office, who cooperated with the 20-30 club in promoting the campaign, reported to have their cars stolen in Pomona shortly before 11 o'clock Monday, last year and 27 of this number. The buildings were almost completely destroyed by flames when Sunday from the parking lot of their caution keys in their cars. Cause of the thefts, however, fortunately, most of the stolen blaze is as yet undetermined.

Survey Findings In Citrus Area Told at Meet

Of 28,000 acres of land along the foothills between Arcata and Dunsmuir and including Pomona and Ontario areas, 40 per cent is covered with citrus groves from which there was a yield of \$15,000,000 for the year.

Statements in this report were made by K. I. Dimes, who is making a five-year study of citrus production in the area.

In 1947 C. S. Benson, president of the county, conducted the survey. Dimes reported that citrus lands and conversion of citrus lands into residential areas.

According to survey findings in the last eight years, there has been less than two per cent increase in citrus acreage. Dimes said that citrus lands are being converted to residential or industrial use.

With a marked increase in the number of dwellings, the land used for houses has increased in eight years from 2.1 per cent to an estimated 4 per cent.

Contrary to general belief, there is less cropland than eight years ago. At the present time it is estimated that 233 persons live in each dwelling as against an average of 227 in 1939.

In the discussion it was pointed out that prominent business, professional and educational leaders feel that the growth of population and industrial activity and factors that already are making Pomona the citrus industry.

Monthly Crop Survey Made By Santa Fe

Lenora and Valencia oranges will start moving from Southern California, but early-season frost damage cut shipments, the Santa Fe railway reported today. In its monthly crop survey the railroad said the Valencia crop was about 50 per cent harvested and that the lemon pick will be light until the new crop starts in mid-November. Cucumber, navel orange have shown good growth and larger sizes than last year in most districts, the railroad said. Navel picking begins in the San Joaquin valley this week, and forecasts set the total navel crop at 15-17,000 boxes. Harvest of an estimated 800,000 boxes of direct grapefruit and a light San Diego county fourth avocado crop will start this month. Except for cold storage varieties, fresh grape shipments are nearly ended, with the total crop slightly below last year, the railroad said. Cauliflower picking has started in Los Angeles county. The 3000-acre San Diego county celery crop will be ready next month, while the celery harvest now is under way in slightly increased acreage in the Salinas, Maria, San Jose and Santa Clara counties, the report stated.

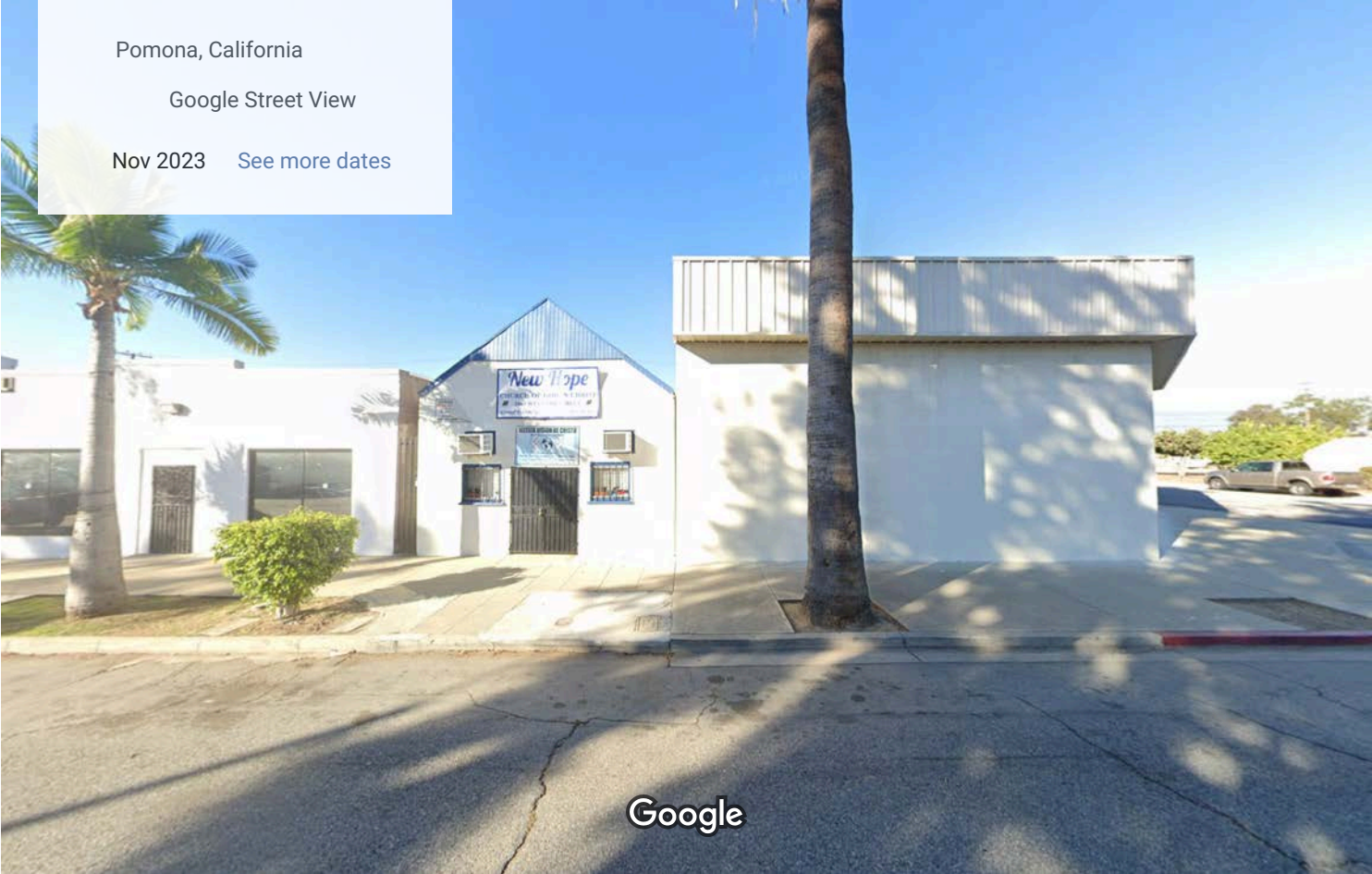
