### Plans Ordered for MWD Line North of Here

Plans and specifications for construction of a 1.5-mile line from Fulton road crossing of the Colorado river segment to the Federal section of Pomona Valley Municipal Water district will be prepared by the Engineering Service Corporation, Los Angeles, under authorization by the district board at its Tuesday session at the Chamber of Commerce. The route over which the line, mostly concrete, will be laid is shown north of Long Fulton and to Base Line, three east of Fulton, and thence north to Pomona drive, according to the general plan. This routing was one of three submitted by the Engineering Service Corporation after having made a survey as contracted for with the board. The routing was recommended by the district's engineering advisory committee led by Paul F. Jaffet. The survey, conducted this week, indicates that the route would cost only one-half as much as the original route but would serve water companies that the former route suggested. The board, the MWD having authorized an expenditure up to \$275,000 for the line. Purpose of the line is to bring water from the aqueduct to one of the highest elevations of the district to permit gravity flow downward. The board approved an application from Avenue Line Mutual Water company, Pomona, for a supply of raw water and authorized taking out membership in the California State Commission of Commerce. Fred Sharp, Pomona city administrator and James Oving, city engineer, attended the board meeting and inquired as to possibilities of distribution lines being made available in Pomona to supply possible industrial needs. Earl H. Larkin, president of the board, pointed out the most critical water district in the portion of a wholesaler of water and cannot pay for distribution lines.

### Upland Tax Rate Set At \$1.68

UPLAND — Assessed valuation increases made it possible for the Upland City Council to fix a city tax rate for the 1953-54 fiscal year at the same as that of last year when it was \$1.68.

First reading was given an ordinance fixing the rate at \$1.68 per \$100 in assessed valuation for the fiscal year 1953-54. The same as during 1952-53. The amount to be raised is \$172,000 compared to \$169,000 last year, the difference being made up by the increased valuation.

Included in the total amount to be raised is \$70,000 general fund, \$20,000 park fund, \$25,000 library fund, \$15,000 employee retirement fund, \$2,000 planning commission, and \$7,000 bond interest and retirement.

### Learn To Live Together Truce Declared in Long War Against Billboards

By JOSEPH J. LIPPER

SACRAMENTO (AP)—In three years, in the long war over billboards, a truce has been declared. An agreement quiet signs over much of the front where, for years, garden clubs, roadside beauty groups and others vigorously fought erection of the huge signs along some highways.

Joseph W. Fontana, San Francisco, public relations director for the outdoor-advertising firm of Foster and Kleiser, thinks the peace because both sides learned to live together. Joseph S. Thompson, San Francisco, president of the California Council, views the agreement as a reasonable basis.

In past battles the state Legislature and local governments, opponents contended the billboards marred the beautiful scenery and dangerously distracted drivers.

Industry spokesmen discounted both claims and argued the posters helped the economy by stimulating business for advertisements.

Reflecting the new calm, perhaps was the fact that measures on billboards were introduced in the 1955 Legislature and neither was pushed.

One was a bill by Sen. Nathan Coombs (R-Cap) permitting signs on highway rights of way—where they are now prohibited.

The other was a resolution by Sen. Robert J. Rozen (D-Weaverville) to allow "dignified and informative" signs on mountain highways.

Both bills were passed in the Senate but were held in committee in the Assembly.

The situation was resolved without legislation when the State Division of Highways posted a standard directional sign in the San Francisco area.

Contrasting the 1955 picture was the bitter fight in 1953 over a bill—later dropped—which would have taken away the county's power to zone against billboards.

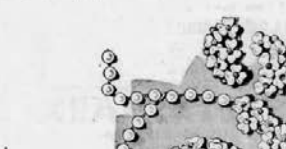

Rabbi Israel Zeilin, dean of the California School of the Hebrew Union College and West Coast director of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, will deliver the dedication sermon.

A special presentation will be made to Rabbi Zeilin in recognition of the personal guidance which he has given to Temple Beth Israel.

Also to be dedicated is a silver "yeg" or Torah pointer which has been donated to the temple by Fred Mosney of Alta Vista in memory of his wife, Mrs. Mary Mosney. The Torah pointer is used, the local rabbi explained, whenever the Torah is read in the synagogue as it is forbidden to touch the sacred writing of the scroll.

Wives of members of the temple board will serve as reception hostesses under the chairmanship of Mrs. Bernard Brownstein of Chatsworth, a member of the temple board.

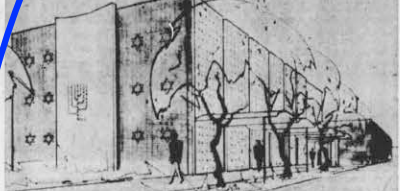

The injured were taken to Pomona Valley Community Hospital and released. Police said each driver of the three cars was fined \$100.

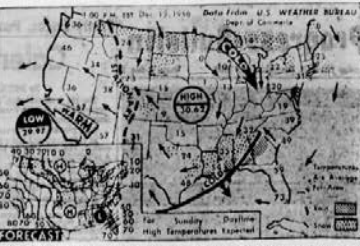

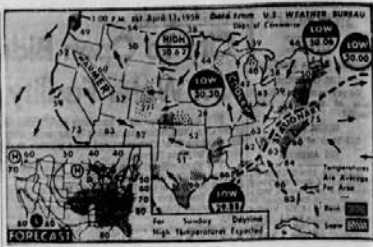
